Re: New Philadelphia Municipal Court 2025 Annual Report

Dear Madams and Sirs:

In 1975, the Ohio General Assembly enacted legislation to establish the New Philadelphia Municipal Court. The Court began hearing cases on January 1, 1976. As we commemorate the 50th year of the Court, it continues to be my privilege to have served my fourteenth year as Judge. I remain committed to providing prompt, fair and impartial administration of justice.

In 2025, the Court handled a total of **7,437** cases, a slight increase from the **7,202** cases handled in 2024. The complexity of the issues in our cases continue to present many challenges in dealing with crime directly related to substance abuse, mental health issues, and homelessness.

We continue to utilize programming to improve outcomes for individuals in the court system. The New Philadelphia Municipal Recovery Court (substance abuse), and Pre-Trial Supervision programs provide effective monitoring through our Probation Department, in collaboration with local law enforcement and mental health and addiction treatment agencies.

In 2025, Judge Von Allman presented training for law enforcement and other justice partners on the topic of Competency to Stand Trial and Not Guilty by Reason of Insanity at the Tuscarawas County Crisis Intervention Training (CIT).

Recording System: Using Court funds, we replaced our obsolete courtroom recording system. The system includes new software, cabling, speakers, and additional microphones to cover areas of the main courtroom. We now can assist hearing impaired individuals, obtain better sound clarity, improve recordings of courtroom proceedings, including immediate replay of the record, and archival capabilities that allows for retrieval continuity.

E-Filing: The Ohio Legislature passed S.B 94 mandating that courts develop and implement electronic filing of court documents, or E-filing, by July of 2025. We updated our case management system, again using court funds, to allow for e-filing, scanning of case file documents, and on-line document view. There are many steps to upgrade the system considering the volume and variety of documents that the Court handles. We continue to roll-out the system upgrades incrementally after we first test the accuracy of the electronic conversion. This creates improved operational efficiency for court personnel, attorneys, and law enforcement.

Reporting to Law Enforcement Compliance Plan: The Court developed and adopted a Compliance Plan as required by the Supreme Court of Ohio to ensure complete, accurate, and timely submission of information into the state's computerized criminal history repository at the Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI), the Ohio Law Enforcement Automated Data System

(LEADS), and other law enforcement data bases. In developing the plan, the Court was re-assured that our existing reporting protocols were already meeting quality assurances. This reporting includes: fingerprints, incident tracking numbers (ITN), mental health adjudications, protection orders, BMV related convictions and points, and sealed and expunged records.

The Court used the vacant Magistrate's office to create an Attorney/Client conference room so that attorneys meeting with their clients have privacy in their communications. This type of space has been long overdue.

General Operations in 2025

A detailed presentation was made to City Council and the City Administration in February of 2025 explaining the priority needs of the building housing the Court, including flooring, lighting, ADA compliant restroom renovations, and other building renovations. The building continues to have significant problems with roof leaks, outdated plumbing and electrical issues, deteriorating floors and windows, and HVAC issues, presenting health and safety issues.

A proposal was made to Council to use a combination of Court funds and City capital improvement funds to address the issues. Council took no action. Those Court funds have since been re-allocated to the General Fund budget. The Court appreciates the financial challenges facing the City, but the issues remain. Future facility options for the Court will need to be considered.

In 2025, the Court remitted **\$1,072,281.62** to the city and county: **\$949,470.22** to the City of New Philadelphia, including special court funds, and **\$122,811.40** to Tuscarawas County, including Law Library and Public Defender fees.

The Court's records are available online at www.npmunicipalcourt.org. Visitors to the website can search open and closed case information, view the daily schedule, obtain information about the Court's operations, and pay financial sanctions on-line. An "Active Warrants" page allows users to search outstanding active warrants. The website has been upgraded to make it mobile-friendly. All computer upgrades and maintenance are paid for with funds generated from court costs.

The Court continues to partner with Tuscarawas County Community Corrections and OhioAMS (Alcohol Monitoring Service) to provide grant supported enhanced drug testing services to probationers and program participants. Employees of OhioAMS conduct the drug screens and report results remotely to staff. In 2025, **2,868** urine drug screens were administered.

Our staff continue to receive on-going training. Many courses are available at no cost through the Ohio Judicial College. All of our bailiffs and security officers maintain their annual firearm certifications. Professional association conferences were also attended.

Magistrate Christine Weimer serves on the board of trustees for the Ohio Association of Magistrates as the First Vice President. She was the Municipal Court Practice Chair from 2013 through 2025 which involves planning education for both Spring and Fall Conferences. Magistrate

Weimer is a member of the nominating committee to vet members for the board of trustees. Magistrate Weimer is also part of the Ohio Judicial College Traffic Law and Procedure Committee.

Magistrate Weimer also works actively with the Judicial College of the Ohio Supreme Court to plan, develop, and deliver educational content for members of the judiciary. She is also part of the faculty that presents education at the Supreme Court of Ohio for all new magistrates that have been appointed by courts across the state.

The Court continues to operate the Municipal Court Work Program with New Philadelphia and Dover. Non-violent defendants can be sentenced to the program in lieu of jail days to perform general clean-up and seasonal tasks in the New Philadelphia downtown area, as well as Tuscora Park, Dover Park, Dover Burial Park and other public facilities maintained by the cities. **In 2025, 136 defendants were ordered to serve a total of 678 days on the work program. If those days had been served in the county jail, the cost to the taxpayers would have been \$104,493.36.**

The New Philadelphia Municipal Recovery Court, first certified by the Supreme Court of Ohio in 2015, was re-certified through the end of 2026. The Court receives a payroll subsidy through the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services for program administrative costs.

The Court uses a state grant-funded Pretrial Supervision program to closely supervise certain defendants while they await trial. In 2025, **478** screenings were conducted in the jail, and **308** defendants were referred to Pretrial Supervision. 90% of defendants in the program successfully completed supervision and treatment requirements.

Municipal Court employees continued “**Casual Fridays for Charity.**” Staff who desire to dress casually on Fridays contribute \$2.00 each. Each month, a different charity is chosen by the staff. **In 2025, employees raised over \$700.00** which was distributed among various charities including: Cleveland Hope Lodge, Friends of the Homeless, Tuscarawas County Humane Society, Akron-Canton Regional Food Bank, Wounded Warrior Project, Fostering Love-Tusc. County, and Community Hospice Truman House.

In closing, I wish to acknowledge the dedication and hard work of my entire staff. I would also like to thank all of you for your cooperation and support. I look forward to working together in the months and years ahead to make our community a better place for everyone.

Clerk of Court Report

Territorial Jurisdiction

The New Philadelphia Municipal Court has territorial jurisdiction within the municipal corporations of New Philadelphia and Dover, and within Wayne, Franklin, Lawrence, Sandy, Sugarcreek, Dover, Fairfield, Warren, Auburn, York, Goshen, Bucks, and Jefferson Townships in Tuscarawas County.

Subject Matter Jurisdiction

Criminal Division:

The Court has jurisdiction over violations of any ordinance of any municipal corporation within its territory, and of any misdemeanor committed within the limits of its territory. The Municipal Court also has jurisdiction to conduct preliminary hearings and other necessary hearings in felony offenses committed within its jurisdiction in order to determine if there is probable cause to hold or recognize the defendant to appear before the Court of Common Pleas.


Civil Division:

The Court has jurisdiction in civil matters in all cases in which the amount claimed by any party, or the appraised value of the personal property sought to be recovered, is less than fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00). The Court also hears civil appeals of various orders of the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles, eviction actions and other landlord/tenant disputes, and Small Claims cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00).


Cases Handled and Terminated in 2025

The New Philadelphia Municipal Court handled **7,437 new cases in 2025**. It should be noted that this figure does not include the number of cases that are reopened each year due to motions to revoke community control sanctions, motions for contempt of court due to failure to comply with court orders, and the collection of civil judgments through garnishments, attachments, and debtors exams.

CILOCS

Contributions in Lieu of Community Service: The Court may permit a defendant who is sentenced to a term of community service to make a reasonable contribution, instead of working the service hours, to the General Fund of the County, Municipality, or other local entity that provides funding to the Court. If more than one entity provides funding, the contribution is disbursed in proportion to the amount of funding provided. We call this program CILOCS.

In 2025, a total of **\$150,662.71** in CILOCS funds were received. Recognizing the expanding responsibilities in delivering court services in probation, declining revenue in the Probation fund, physical needs of the 75-year-old Municipal building, and the work involved in administering the CILOCS program, the New Philadelphia City Council passed a Resolution in 2016 to designate the CILOCS funds for the Court's exclusive use. The Resolution was amended in 2018 to return to the City of New Philadelphia a 20% contribution toward the grant match requirements for the Victim's Advocate if needed.

Payment Plans

Defendants who request additional time to pay fines and court costs are assessed a \$25.00 payment plan fee. Offenders who owe the court money may be granted time to pay, after which the delinquent balance is forwarded to the Court's collection agencies.

Collections

The Court follows all state, federal and constitutional guidelines in assessing and collecting fines, costs and fees and determining each defendant's ability to pay. Defendants are advised in writing of their rights and the Court's procedures regarding the imposition and collection of financial sanctions.

By local rule, payments are applied first to local court costs, then to reimbursements, then to restitution, and then to fines.

We have referred certain cases for collection to **Capital Recovery Systems** since 2012. This service is at no cost to the Court and resulted in the collection of **\$13,988.08** in 2025 for fines and costs that may have otherwise gone uncollected. Since inception, Capital Recovery Systems has collected **\$661,872.70** for the Court.

In December, 2017, the Court entered into a Delinquent Debt Collection Agreement with the **Ohio Attorney General's Office** as an additional means of collecting funds owed to the Court. This service is also at no cost to the Court. The Attorney General's Office collected **\$152,510.77** in fines, fees, and restitution in 2025. Since inception, the Ohio Attorney General's Office has collected **\$1,373,788.35** for the Court.

Court Receipts and Disbursements – Traffic/Criminal, Civil and Small Claims

Receipts for the Court totaled **\$1,869,504.02 in 2025**, an increase of 5.69% from the **\$1,768,843.38 in 2024**. This amount excludes the balance on hand as of January 1, 2025.

Receipts of the Criminal and Traffic Division totaled **\$1,141,607.26**. This represents fines, court costs, interest, bonds, and fees.


Receipts of the Civil Division totaled **\$727,896.76**. Civil receipts include filing fees, deposits for other costs, bonds, garnishments, judgments paid, and interest.

In 2025, the Court remitted **\$1,072,281.62** to the city and county: **\$949,470.22** to the City of New Philadelphia, including special court funds, and **\$122,811.40** to Tuscarawas County, including the Law Library and Public Defender fee.


The Court's criminal and traffic disbursements are divided among the various political subdivisions included within the territory of the Court. Civil disbursements are divided pursuant to statute.

2025 Traffic and Criminal Disbursements-\$1,141,607.26:




2025 Traffic and Criminal Special Court Funds Disbursements - \$590,653.66:




2025 Civil and Small Claims Disbursements - \$727,896.76:

Some of the funds received and disbursed by the Court are held by the Court temporarily for others. For example, wage garnishments received on behalf of a creditor. For this reason, the bank accounts of the Court will always reflect a balance on hand amount.

Specific Funds

Computer Fund

Current legislation allows the Court to collect additional court costs that are deposited into specific funds for the computerization of the Court. This money can be used to purchase and maintain computer systems for the clerk's office. The money can also be used to provide computerized legal research for the Court. All computer paper, supplies, and a portion of salaries/benefits for computer staff can be purchased or paid for through this fund.

Probation Fund

A monthly probation supervision fee is assessed to all defendants admitted to a term of probation. These fees are then deposited into the Probation Fund. This fund is used to provide necessary equipment and pay expenses for the Probation Department, including salaries.

Special Projects Fund

The purpose of this fund is to acquire and pay for special projects of the Court including, but not limited to, the acquisition of additional facilities or the rehabilitation of existing facilities, the acquisition of equipment, the hiring and training of staff, mediation or dispute resolution services, the employment of magistrates, the training and education of the judge, acting judges, and magistrates, and other related services. The Court, by local rule, charges a Special Project fee on the filing of each criminal case, civil action or proceeding, or judgment by confession.

Domestic Violence Fund

If a municipal court offers a special program or service in cases of a specific type, the municipal court by rule may assess an additional charge in a case of that type, over and above court costs, to cover the special program or service. The New Philadelphia Municipal Court has created a Domestic Violence Fund from a fee assessed on all domestic violence filings. This fund is utilized primarily to pay for staff training on domestic violence topics.

Dispute Resolution Fund

The Court operates a Dispute Settlement Program to resolve certain cases without a trial. Income tax and bad check cases may proceed through the Dispute Settlement Program. The purpose of establishing the Dispute Resolution Fund is to cover the cost of the program including personnel costs.

Criminal Diversion Program Fund

The Criminal Diversion Program Fund was created in conjunction with the Criminal Diversion Program (CDP). Eligible defendants pay a diversion program fee which is used, in part, to meet personnel and other costs related to administration of the program.

Payment Plan Fund

By local rule, the Court created a Payment Plan Program to promote payment compliance. Criminal or traffic offenders may delay payment of fines and costs up to 30 days or enter into a payment plan. The fee to participate is used to defray the costs of the program.

Indigent Drivers Alcohol Treatment Fund (I.D.A.T.)

Pursuant to state law, when individuals are charged with or convicted of operating a vehicle under the influence of drugs or alcohol (O.V.I.), or for refusing a breath test, their driver's license is suspended for a period of time. After the suspension is over, they must pay a \$315.00 reinstatement fee to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles. \$40.00 of the of the reinstatement fee is directed to the I.D.A.T. fund administered by the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Addiction Services.

By law, the municipal court is required to have an I.D.A.T. fund. These funds are used to pay for the cost of alcohol and/or drug addiction treatment if a defendant is ordered into treatment and cannot afford to pay the cost of attending the program. In 2005, the state legislature amended the I.D.A.T. statute to allow courts to utilize these funds to pay for alcohol monitoring anklets for defendants in treatment. **In 2025, these funds were used for treatment and/or anklets for 6 indigent O.V.I defendants.**

Indigent Drivers Interlock and Alcohol Monitoring Fund (I.D.I.A.M.)

A state law which became effective in April of 2025 increased mandatory O.V.I. fines by \$190.00, and lowered reinstatement fees. \$125.00 of OVI fines are allocated into this fund which the court was required to establish. These funds are to be used exclusively to cover the cost of immobilizing or disabling devices, including ignition interlock devices and alcohol monitoring devices for indigent OVI offenders as ordered by a judge. A surplus can be declared in the fund and transferred to the I.D.A.T. fund. **In 2025, 15 indigent OVI defendants received assistance to pay the cost of alcohol monitoring devices or ignition interlock devices using this fund.**

Contributions in Lieu of Community Service Fund (CILOCS)

In 2011, Ohio Revised Code Section 2929.27(B) was enacted as part of Substitute House Bill 5 which deals with sentencing in criminal and traffic cases. It allows an offender who has been sentenced to a term of community service to request that the court modify the sentence to authorize the offender to make a reasonable contribution in lieu of community service. These CILOC funds, by statute, are required to be deposited in the general fund of the Court's funding authorities, which are the City of New Philadelphia and Tuscarawas County. On March 28, 2016, New Philadelphia City Council enacted Resolution 14-2016 for the purpose of supporting, in part, the City's obligations under O.R.C. 1901.36 to provide the Court with suitable facilities and to assist the Court with increased probation supervision costs associated with local increase in drug addiction and related criminal activity. The Resolution directed that funds collected under O.R.C. 2929.27(B) be deposited into the CILOCS fund, for the Court's exclusive use as needed. Since inception, the Court has used the funds for a variety of purposes including Probation Department funding, building improvements, and enhanced drug testing services. The Resolution was amended in 2018 to provide for the return a 20% contribution to the City toward the grant match requirements for the New Philadelphia Victim's Advocate, if needed.

Probation Department Report

In 2025, the Probation Department was staffed by Chief Probation Officer **Leslie Miller** along with Probation Officers **Mindy Craig and Brian Mathews**.

Probation Officers meet regularly with defendants on their assigned caseloads to ensure that all court orders are followed. Defendants on Community Control Sanctions are sentenced to a term of incarceration in the county jail. All or part of the jail sentence may be suspended, and the defendant is then placed on Community Control Sanctions. All defendants are required to be law abiding (no new criminal or serious traffic offenses) and to pay all financial sanctions including probation fees. Other terms of Community Control Sanctions will include, depending on the particular offense, to be drug and alcohol free and submit to regular, random drug and alcohol testing; complete substance abuse, anger or mental health counseling; pay restitution to victims; complete an OVI Driver's Intervention Program; and, complete on the Municipal Court Work Program, or Inmate Work Program. Probation terms vary in both duration and conditions. Most probationers are supervised for a year or more.

The Probation Department is also responsible for conducting and preparing pre-sentence investigation reports for defendants awaiting sentencing.


The Probation Department also provides programming and supervision for defendants placed on Pretrial Supervision, Criminal Diversion and the New Philadelphia Municipal Recovery Court. In addition, Probation Officers monitor cases in which defendants are not placed on a term of probation, but who are required to serve jail, perform community service, or complete the Municipal Court Work Program, Inmate Work Program or Driver's Intervention Program.

The Probation Officers obtained over **100** hours of continuing education hours in 2025. Trainings included mental health topics, drug trends, domestic violence issues and Specialized Dockets.

Probation Statistics:

The Probation Department added **471** defendants to be monitored on Community Control Sanctions in 2025. On January 1, 2025, the probation department supervised **505** active individuals. On December 31, 2025, there were **484** individuals on active supervision.


The following chart outlines the number of defendants ordered to programs monitored by the probation department in 2025:



Drug Screens:

The Court continues to partner with Tuscarawas County Community Corrections and OhioAMS to provide enhanced drug testing services. Included in this partnership is a random daily telephone call-in service. Defendants who are subject to random drug testing must call in daily to see if they have been selected to test and must appear to test that same day within a short time frame. In 2025, **2,868** urine drug tests were administered between the probation department and the OhioAMS testing office.

New Philadelphia Municipal Recovery Court:

The New Philadelphia Municipal Recovery Court was established and originally certified by the Ohio Supreme Court Commission on Specialized Docket in September 2015. In 2024 the program was recertified through 2026. The Recovery Court focuses on defendants who have been charged with a misdemeanor offense directly or indirectly related to, or resulting from, substance dependence.

The Recovery Court program is designed to hold individuals accountable to their families and society, restore families, enhance public safety by reducing criminal and drug related activity, reduce jail and law enforcement costs to the taxpayers, and provide an opportunity for drug dependent individuals to become sober, positive, and contributing members of our community. The program incorporates medication assisted treatment, inpatient, partial hospitalization, or intensive outpatient therapies, sober support groups including AA/NA, mentor and peer support, community involvement and other best practices for addiction treatment as approved and adopted by the National Association of Drug Court Professionals, now known as All Rise.

As a result of obtaining Specialized Docket Certification, the Court was also able to apply for and receive a grant from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services in the amount of **\$40,000.00** to offset payroll costs of our Chief Probation Officer, who is also our Specialized Docket Coordinator.

In 2025, **10** individuals were referred to The New Philadelphia Municipal Recovery Court. **Seven** participants successfully graduated and **3** were terminated as unsuccessful. As of December 31, 2025, there were **10** active participants.

Fifty-two individuals have successfully graduated from the program since inception. Of those, **78%** have not had a new criminal or alcohol/drug related offense within two years of graduation.

Addiction Treatment Program (ATP) Recovery Supports and Treatment Services funds through an Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services grant, administered by the ADAMHS Board of Tuscarawas and Carroll Counties, were used to improve treatment services for program recipients. The Court received an additional **\$1,965.00** in 2025 in Addiction Treatment Program (ATP) Recovery Supports and Treatment Services funds to help cover administrative expenses of the specialized docket.

The Court also received a grant in the amount of **\$13,260.00** from the ADAMHS Board to offset the cost of drug testing supplies for those participating in Recovery Court and other probationers who are enrolled in the ADAHMS Board system of care.

Since December 2021, the Court, along with The Tuscarawas County Common Pleas Court, has partnered with Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD) to provide the Jobs for Recovery Program. OOD Jobs for Recovery provides employment assistance to individuals with substance use disorders and/or mental health disabilities. The courts have two full-time, dedicated, OOD staff who work alongside the courts' treatment providers for the specialized dockets and probation departments. These staff members attend treatment team meetings and court proceedings to ensure rapid engagement of each participant in career counseling, job placement, and retention services. They also help address employment barriers, such as transportation and work clothes.

In 2025, **28** participants were enrolled with OOD for employment services.

Pretrial Supervision Program:

The Court has utilized Pretrial Supervision to closely supervise certain defendants while they await trial. In 2025, **478** screenings were conducted, and **308** defendants were referred to Pretrial Supervision.

To increase pretrial supervision services and further reduce incarceration costs, the Court, beginning in 2016, applied for and received a grant through the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections, Bureau of Community Sanctions. The Court received a renewal for 2 years in 2025, receiving \$73,275.50 for the 2026 fiscal year and \$73,275.50 for the 2027 fiscal year. The grant is used to employ a probation officer and to pay for electronic monitoring of defendants. In 2025, **7** defendants wore GPS location anklets for a total of **154** days and **44** defendants wore alcohol monitoring anklets for a total of **1,663** days while on Pretrial Supervision.

Ohio Guidestone renewed a grant called P.R.O.P.S. (Pre-Release Outreach and Personal Support), which assigns a case-manager to the New Philadelphia Municipal Court to provide case-management services to those in the Pretrial Supervision Program. The P.R.O.P.S. program began

in October 2017. In 2025, **252** individuals on pretrial supervision received case management services and were scheduled for mental health and/or substance abuse services within 3 days of release from jail. This is a vital service which has contributed to the success of the Pretrial Supervision Program.

In 2025, **90%** of defendants in the Pretrial Program successfully completed supervision.

Non-Probation Community Service:

Some non-violent offenders are not required to serve a term of probation but are given community service as part of their sentence. Leslie Miller, Chief Probation Officer, also serves as the compliance officer for these offenders. In 2025, **338** defendants were ordered to complete **8,400** hours of community service.

Inmate Work Program:

Sixty-nine defendants were assigned to serve **307** days on the Inmate Work Program in lieu of jail. This number includes defendants on probation and not on probation. This program results in lower inmate housing costs at the jail and the collection of a significant amount of trash and recyclables from our highways. **At an average cost of \$154.12 per day, the cost to the Tuscarawas County taxpayers would have been \$47,314.84 if those defendants had served jail.**

Municipal Court Work Program:

The Court continues to run the Municipal Court Work Program. Originally partnered with the New Philadelphia Service Director's Office, the program added the City of Dover to the program in 2023. Non-violent defendants can be sentenced to the program in lieu of jail days to perform general clean-up and seasonal tasks in the New Philadelphia downtown area, as well as Tuscora Park, Dover Park, Dover Burial Park and other public facilities owned or maintained by the cities. In 2025, **136** defendants were ordered to serve a total of **678** days on the work program. **If those days had been served in jail, the cost to the Tuscarawas County taxpayers would have been \$104,493.36.**

Court Security/Bailiffs

Matt Henry is the Chief Bailiff/Chief Court Security Officer. He is assisted by Bailiffs **Joe Reiger, Rick McCoy, and part-time/substitute bailiffs Dave Scott, and Terry Warner**. The bailiffs assist in the courtrooms, serve subpoenas and other process (including evictions), and provide security throughout the building. All of our bailiffs are former or current law enforcement officers and maintain their annual firearm certification qualifications through the New Philadelphia Police Department.
